

Grand Mesa Scenic and Historic Byway

This "playground in the sky" climbs from the rugged Plateau Canyon floor to the cool evergreen mesa forests, 11,000 feet up. Featured are hundreds of sparkling lakes, wildflower meadows and forests of shimmering aspen and pine. Take a side trip to Lands End Overlook where the Grand Valley unfolds below.

Time Two hours to drive the entire byway, or 90 minutes to

Fees



There are no fees for traveling the byway. There are overnight campground fees per USFS schedules and private campground fees.

Accessibility



Grand Mesa Visitor Center is handicap accessible. The Lands End Observatory is not handicap accessible.

Camping



Camping is available along the byway in a number of locations.

All campgrounds include picnic tables, water, fire pits, latrines, and wooded areas. There are no RV hookups and no dump stations. There is a 14-day, 2-vehicle limit.

Special Considerations

- Please be aware that wildfires are an ever-present danger in the dry summer months. Follow all posted signs regarding campfires and do not throw cigarettes out the car window.
- If you are driving a large RV and find that you are relishing the scenery more slowly than those in your rear view mirror, please be courteous and pull over to let them pass.
- Please respect property owners' rights by not trespassing or littering.
- This byway traverses high mountain passes, so be prepared for all types of weather.

- High altitudes bring increased sun exposure and reduced oxygen, so wear sunscreen and sunglasses and don't overexert yourself.

Restrictions

The main road is open year-round. However, Spur Road to Land's End is closed October through May.

Seasons

Best Time to Drive

To see wildflowers, the best time to drive the byway is late spring and early summer for wildflowers. To view vibrant foliage, the best time to drive the byway is late September.

High Season

The byway is busiest from June through September.

The byway follows CO-65 for its entirety from the northern end at the Mesa exit on I-70 to the southern terminus at Cedaredge. The byway also includes a spur road that travels along Land's End Road to Land's End.

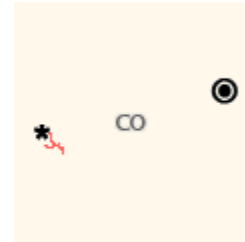

Road Trip: Grand Mesa Must See Tour

Departure: Lands End Observatory
Destination: Cedaredge Welcome Center and Pioneer Town
Time to allow: 1 day

The impressive Grand Mesa, formed by lava flows, glaciers, and erosional forces, dominates the rugged scenery in this tour. At an elevation of over two miles above sea level, overlooks offer magnificent views of alpine forests, numerous lakes and streams, and mountains of the surrounding region. Starting at the Lands End Observatory, the tour descends more than 6,000 feet through four ecological zones that support a vast array of plant and animal life. Finish the tour with a visit to the restored Cedaredge Pioneer Town. Here, you will learn about the history of the area and of the people who first settled the land.

- **Start: Lands End Observatory**



The tour begins with spectacular views around the Lands End Observatory. This structure, which is listed on the register of historic sites, was built in the late 1930s as a Public works project. It is perched on the edge of Grand Mesa and offers views of the valley 6,000 feet below and the La Sal mountains in Utah to the west.

- **Stop 1: Land-O-Lakes Overlook**

Directions from previous place: From Lands End Observatory, take CO 65 and drive south to the sign for the Land-O-Lakes Overlook.
Suggested Time at This Site: 30 minutes



Due to its distinctive geology, the Grand Mesa is dotted with over 300 lakes and reservoirs. A short trail to this overlook provides an incredible view of many of these lakes and also of the West Elk Mountains to the East.

- **Stop 2: Grand Mesa Visitor Center**

This Site:

Visit this beautiful log structure located at the intersection of CO 65 and Forest Development Road 121. It is open from 9 to 5, seven days a week from June to September with the same hours on weekends for most of the rest of the year. Visitor information, exhibits, interpretive materials, and a hiking trail provide for interactive enjoyment.

These facilities are located in the town of Cedaredge. Exhibits are open to the public from 9 to 5, seven days a week from Memorial day to Labor Day. Both provide visitor information, exhibits, and a tour of a reconstructed town which depicts the life of early pioneers in the area.
